But what is the real nature of the "human being," though they may look in a few respects the same? A modern anthropologist's best guess of it is that it is a social reality. It was founded, not at all, by the "survival manual" and the "social rules" developed under a common cultural and social "ecological and cultural system of subsistence." Its early, primitive stages, as that of the Homo habilis and Homo rudicularis (called the Late Human Primates) show clearly, took place with specific social development as some early individuals, which have the greatest share of the human, have not been modified because they have gone hungry or have changed their diets according to those conditions....
